Ruth Aguilera Northeastern University

Ruth V. Aguilera is the Distinguished Darla and Frederick Brodsky
Trustee Professor in Global Business at the D'Amore-McKim School of
Business at Northeastern University and a Visiting Professor at ESADE
Business School. She serves as Chair of the Board of Directors of the
International Corporate Governance Society, and in the international
advisory committees of Rennes School of Business (France), IAE
Business School (Argentina), Indian Institute of Management
Bangalore (India), and ESADE Center of Corporate Governance
(Spain). She is a Fellow of the Academy of International Business,
Academy of Management, and the Strategic Management Society.
She was a Senior Editor at Corporate Governace: An Internatioal
Review, is an outgoing Senior Editor at Organization Science and is
currently an Associate Editor at Academy of Management Review.



Marco Becht Solvay Brussels School and ECGI

Marco Becht is a Professor of Finance and the Goldschmidt Professor of Corporate Governance at the Solvay Brussels School for Economics and Management at Université libre de Bruxelles. He is also a Founder Member, a Fellow and the Executive Director of the European Corporate Governance Institute (ECGI). In 2003 and 2012, he was Visiting Professor and Fellow at the Saïd Business School, University of Oxford, in 2008 Max Schmidheiny Visiting Professor for Entrepreneurship and Risk at the University of St. Gallen, in 2011 Visiting Professor at Stanford Law School and a Visiting Fellow at the Rock Center for Corporate Governance and in 2013 a Visiting Fellow at Columbia Law School. Beyond his core academic activities Becht is a member of the Group of Financial Market Law Experts of the German Ministry of Finance and a Senior Academic Adviser to Oxera, the Economic Consultancy.



Joon Hyug Chung Seoul National University

Joon Hyug Chung is an associate professor at Seoul National University School of Law. His research area includes corporate and financial law, with a focus on ESG, M&A, and fintech. He is a regular advisor to the Korean government on corporate law, financial regulation, and competition law. Recently, he led several notable government projects on mandatory takeover bids, share repurchases, insider trading, dividend frameworks for listed companies, sustainability disclosure, and regulations on public M&A. Professor Chung practiced M&A before joining academia and was acknowledged as a leading lawyer in Korea by Chambers Global, Legal500, and IFLR.



Fabrizio Ferri University of Miami and ECGI

**Fabrizio Ferri** joined the University of Miami in 2018. His research focuses on corporate governance, with particular emphasis on shareholder activism, boards, executive compensation and ESC. His research has been presented at numerous conferences worldwide and published in the leading journals in accounting and finance. He is currently an editor at The Accounting Review and an associate editor at Management Science. Professor Ferri earned and an MBA and Ph.D. from the Stern School of Business (NYU). Prior to joining the University of Miami, he taught at Harvard Business School and Columbia Business School. He is a Research Member of ECGI.

Maloney Professor of Business Law at Fordham Law School. She holds a B.A. from Cornell University and a J.D. from Yale Law School.



Stavros Gadinis

Stavros Gadinis is the George R. Johnson Professor of Law and Faculty Director of the Berkeley Center for Law and Business at Berkeley. His research examines questions in corporate law and financial regulation, both domestic and international and he is widely published. Before entering into academia, he practiced corporate law for four years in Europe. Gadinis completed his S.J.D. at Harvard in May 2010. He also holds an LL.M. degree from the University of Cambridge (UK), and a law degree from Aristotle University, Greece.

Matteo Gatti is Professor of Law at Rutgers Law School. Prior to joining the Rutgers faculty, he also practiced on corporate and M&A matters at Cleary Gottlieb in Rome, Milan, Moscow, and New York, and served as M&A and international in-house counsel for a cable TV company listed on the NYSE. Professor Gatti is the author of a book and several scholarly articles and chapters published on primary law journals, books, and treaties. Jeffrey N. Gordon is the Richard Paul Richman Professor of Law at Columbia Law School, Visiting Professor in the Law Faculty of Oxford University, and a Fellow of the European Corporate Governance Institute. He is co-director of Columbia Law School's Millstein Center for Global Markets and Corporate Ownership as well as co-director of the Richman Center for Business, Law and Public Policy. He is the co-author of Principles of Financial Regulation, Oxford University Press 2016, and co-editor of the forthcoming Oxford Handbook on Corporate Law and Governance, Oxford University Press 2017. While at the U.S. Treasury, he worked on the Chrysler Corporation loan guarantee program and financial regulation.



**Gen Goto**University of Tokyo

Gen Goto is Professor of Law at the University of Tokyo, Graduate Schools for Law and Politics, in Japan. His main field of research is comparative corporate governance, with a recent focus on the role of shareholders and its interaction with ESG issues in the Japanese context. He has visited Harvard Law School as Visiting Scholar at East Asian Legal Studies (2013-2015, 2018), and has taught at National University of Singapore, Faculty of Law (2017, 2019, 2021) and at Radzyner Law School of IDC Herzliya in Israel (2019).



Geneviève Helleringer ESSEC Business School, Oxford Law Faculty and ECGI

Genevieve Helleringer is a law Professor and faculty member at Essec Business School and Oxford Law Faculty, where she is also the deputy director of the Institute of European and Comparative Law. She is a research fellow at Lady Margaret Hall (Oxford), a research member and board member of the ECGI and she sits on the Board of Appeal of the European Financial Supervisory Authorities. She is admitted to the New York and the Paris Bars and is a qualified mediator. Before completing her doctoral work, she worked for Shiseido in Japan and practised private equity and capital market law at Willkie Farr & Gallagher and Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer in New York and Paris (2000-2006). She received the French Academy Grand Prize. She is an academic editor of the Oxford Business Law Blog and a founding and executive editor of the Journal of Financial Regulation (OUP). She has been a visiting professor at UCLA and a visiting scholar at the Max Planck Institute in Hamburg.

Jennifer is Chair of the ECGI Research Committee and Academic Fellow of the Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence on Sustainable Finance and EU Law (EUSFiL). She is Director of the Corporate Purpose section of ECGI's Responsible Capitalism Project and Director and Vice Chair of the GCGC.



Martina Jasova

Martina Jasova is an assistant professor of economics at Barnard College, Columbia University. Her research combines empirical evidence and economic theory at the intersection of macroeconomics and finance. She works with granular micro-level data to provide answers to macro questions on topics related to financial frictions, central bank policies, and the sustainability. Prior to joining Barnard College, she was a visiting fellow at Princeton University and worked at the European Central Bank and the Bank for International Settlements. She received a Ph.D. in Economics from Charles University in Prague.



Kathryn Judge Columbia Law School and ECGI

Kathryn Judge is the Harvey J. Goldschmid Professor of Law at Columbia Law School. She previously served as a member of the Task Force on Financial Stability co-sponsored by the Hutchins Center on Fiscal & Monetary Policy at the Brookings Institution and the Initiative on Global Markets at the University of Chicago Booth School of Business and on Financial Research Advisory Committee of the Office of Financial Research. During her tenure on the FRAC, she co-chaired the LIBOR transition and financial innovation subcommittees. Prior to joining Columbia, Judge clerked for Judge Richard Posner of the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals and Justice Stephen Breyer of the U.S. Supreme Court.

Kobi Kastiel is a Visiting Scholar at New York University School of Law, and Professor of Law at Tel Aviv University. He is also a Senior Research Fellow of the Program on Corporate Governance at Harvard Law School, a non-resident Affiliate Fellow of the Stigler Center at University of Chicago, and a Research Member of the European Corporate Governance Institute (ECGI). Kastiel earned his SJD and LLM from Harvard Law School. He is the recipient of a number of research awards and scholarships, including, most recently, the Tzeltner Prize for an outstanding young legal scholar in Israel.

Woochan Kim is a Professor of Finance at the Korea University Business School and a research member of ECGI. His primary research interest lies in empirical corporate governance. In recognition of his academic contribution, he was honored with the inaugural Korean Corporate Governance Award in 2022. Outside the academic sphere, he heads the Economic Reform Research Institute (ERRI) and the Solidarity for Economic Reform (SER), both of which are committed to safeguarding minority shareholders' interests and chaebol reform.



Michael Klausner Stanford University and ECGI

Michael Klausner is the Nancy and Charles Munger Professor of Business and Professor of Law at Stanford Law School and Visiting Professor of Law at NYU. He teaches and writes in the areas of corporate law, corporate governance, and business transactions. He recently published Deals: The Economic Structure of Business Transactions (Harvard University Press 2024). Prior to that, his most recent writing analyzed the financial and governance abuses of SPACs.



Erik Lidman Stockholm University

Erik Lidman is an Associate Professor of company law at the Stockholm School of Economics and the Department of Law at Gothenburg University and director of the SSE Corporate Governance Institute. Research is focused on corporate governance in listed companies and capital market regulation, generally with a law and economics methodology. Current research projects focus on takeovers, dual-class share structures, corporate bond regulation and the purpose of the corporation.



Dorothy S. Lund Columbia Law School and ECGI

**Dorothy S. Lund** is a professor of law at Columbia Law School. Her research has been published in many journals and op-eds and other writings in many media outlets. She received a JD from Harvard Law School, where she was an Olin Fellow in Law and Economics. She then clerked for Chief Justice Leo E. Strine Jr. of the Delaware Supreme Court and Judge Joel M. Flaum of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit. Before entering academia, Lund practiced corporate law at Sullivan & Cromwell LLP in New York.

Pedro Matos is the Academic Director of Mayo Center for Asset Management, holds the John G. Macfarlane Family Chair and is the James A. and Stacy Cooper Bicentennial Professor of Business Administration at the University of Virginia Darden School of Business. He is a Research Associate at the European Corporate Governance Institute (ECGI) and a member of the UN-sponsored Principles for Responsible Investing (PRI) Academic Network Advisory Committee. He previously taught at the University of Southern California and holds a Ph.D. in Finance from INSEAD.



Curtis Milhaupt Stanford University and ECGI

**Curtis J. Milhaupt** is the William F. Baxter-Visa International Professor of Law at Stanford Law School, a Senior Fellow, by courtesy, of the Freeman Spogli Institute for International Studies at Stanford University, and Fellow, ECGI. His research focuses on comparative corporate governance, with a particular focus on East Asia.

**John Morley** is a Professor of Law at Yale Law School. Morley is a leading expert on the regulation and structure of mutual funds, private equity funds, and hedge funds. He also writes broadly about the law and economics of organization. His research on organization includes a study of why law firms collapse and a history of the common law trust as a substitute for the corporate form. He also writes about the law of trusts and estates and served as the reporter for the Uniform Directed Trust Act.



Mariana Pargendler FGV Law School in São Paulo and ECGI

Mariana Pargendler is Full Professor of Law at Fundação Getulio Vargas (FGV) Law School in São Paulo, where she is also a director of the Center for Law, Economics, and Governance. She has served as Global Professor of Law at New York University School of Law (Buenos Aires campus), and is a Research Member of ECGI. She holds an LL.B. and a PhD (Law) from the Federal University of Rio Grande do Sul (Brazil), as well LL.M. and J.S.D. degrees from Yale Law School. Pargendler will join Harvard Law School as Professor of Law in July 2024.



Elizabeth Pollman University of Pennsylvania and ECGI

Elizabeth Pollman is a Professor of Law at the University of Pennsylvania Carey Law School and an ECGI Research Member. She teaches and writes in business law, with a particular focus on corporate governance, purpose, and personhood, as well as startups, venture capital, and entrepreneurship. She serves as a member of the ABA Corporate Laws Committee and co-director of Penn's Institute for Law & Economics. She practiced at Latham & Watkins in Silicon Valley and Los Angeles, and clerked for Judge Raymond Fisher of the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals. She earned her BA and JD, with distinction, from Stanford University.



Dan Puchniak Singapore Management University ECGI

Dan Puchniak is a Professor in the Yong Pung How School of Law (YPHSL) at Singapore Management University, an ECGI Research Member and the Editor-in-Chief of the ECGI Blog, and the Director of the YPHSL Centre for Commercial Law in Asia. He is an internationally recognized scholar in the field of comparative corporate law and governance, with a focus on Asia. Dan has held visiting academic positions at leading universities around the world, advised international organizations on the development of corporate law in Asia, and served as an expert in high stakes complex corporate law disputes in Asia.

Bharat Ramamurti Bharat Ramamurti served as deputy director of the National Economic Council and advisor for strategic economic communications in the Biden-Harris administration from 2021 through 2023. In that role, he helped shape the administration's economic message, worked with Congress to secure the enactment of several landmark pieces of economic legislation, and helped lead the administration's efforts on student debt, competition policy, small business, broadband, housing, technology and social media platforms, financial regulation, and more. He is a graduate of Harvard College and Yale Law School.



Georg Ringe
University of
Hamburg and ECGI

Georg Ringe is Director of the Institute of Law & Economics at the University of Hamburg and Visiting Professor at the University of Oxford, Faculty of Law. His research focuses on questions of corporate law, capital markets, and financial regulation, from an interdisciplinary and comparative perspective. He is a Research Member with ECGI, Vice-President of the European Banking Institute, Frankfurt, and co-editor of the Journal of Financial Regulation. He is currently a Visiting Professor at Stanford Law School.



Mark Roe Harvard Law School

Mark J. Roe is the David Berg Professor of Law at Harvard Law School, where he teaches courses on corporate law, corporate finance, and corporate bankruptcy. Much of his research investigates how political forces shape, and are shaped by, the large corporation. The final chapters of 'Missing the Target: Why Stock Market Short-Termism Is Not the Problem' do the same, pointing to why it's politically convenient for key groups and leaders to assess stock market short-termism as more pernicious than it is.



Martin Schmalz
University of
Oxford and ECGI

Martin Schmalz is a Professor of Finance, Economics, and Real Estate at Oxford's Saïd Business School, where he heads the Finance, Accounting, Management, and Economics Area. He serves as Academic Director of the Blockchain Strategy and co-director of the Open Banking & AI in Finance Programmes. He was invited to present his antitrust scholarship to regulators and policymakers across the globe, including the US Department of Justice, FTC, White House Council of Economic Advisers, European Commission, European Parliament, OECD, and universities around the world. He holds a PhD in Economics from Princeton University.



Roy Shapira Reichman University (IDC) and ECGI

Roy Shapira is a professor of law at Harry Radzyner Law School at Reichman University (IDC). He focuses on reputation, regulation, and corporate governance and has published widely on these topics, including a book with Cambridge University Press (Law and Reputation (2020)), and articles in leading law reviews. Shapira has taught for six years a seminar on these topics at Harvard's Economics Department (winning six teaching excellence awards), and has also practiced law and reputation, providing consulting and thought leadership services to leading business companies. Prior to joining the IDC faculty Shapira headed the research efforts of the Stigler Center at the Booth School of Business (University of Chicago).



Oliver Spalt University of Mannheim and ECGI

Oliver G. Spalt holds the Chair of Financial Markets and Financial Institutions at the University of Mannheim. His work is published in the most prestigious academic journals and has received numerous awards. While working at Tilburg University was repeatedly included in the "Top 40 economists in the Netherlands" list. He was the recipient of a prestigious VIDI grant from The Netherlands Organisation for Scientific Research (NWO). Before joining the University of Mannheim in September 2019, Professor Spalt has been Professor of Behavioral Finance at Tilburg University. Prior to that, he has taught at the University of Texas at Austin.



Tobias Tröger Goethe University Frankfurt, Leibniz Institute SAFE and ECGI

**Tobias Tröger** is Professor of Private Law, Commercial and Business Law and Jurisprudence at the House of Finance at Goethe-University Frankfurt am Main. He is also a Director of the Cluster Law and Finance at the Leibniz Institute Sustainable Architecture for Finance in Europe (SAFE) and an Associate Professor at the Institute of Monetary and Financial Stability (IMFS), two Frankfurt based think tanks devoted to providing cutting edge research and evidence-based policy advice. Tobias Tröger inter alia advises the European Parliament on matters of banking supervision. He is a graduate of Harvard Law School, Eberhard-Karls-University Tübingen and Ludwig-Maximilians-University Munich.



**Boris Vallée** Harvard University

Boris Vallée is the Torstein Hagen Associate Professor of Business Administration and an Associate Professor in the Finance Unit. His research traces the motives behind and the effects of financial innovation in recent decades, focusing on innovative products, processes and objectives. He pursues this line of inquiry through empirical studies of corporate finance, household finance, public finance, and financial institutions, developing novel data sets and measures. He holds a Ph.D. in finance and a M.Sc. in management, both from HEC Paris, and is a CFA Charterholder. Before beginning his doctoral studies, Professor Vallée was an investment banker at Deutsche Bank in London.



Umakanth Varottil National University of Singapore and ECGI
